

Tax Receiver Information

Tax payments made via internet banking:

To avoid paying a penalty, homeowners planning to authorize their banks to pay their tax bills via internet banking should do so well ahead of the tax due dates (Town & County **2/10** and School **10/1**). These bank payments could take two weeks or more to reach your local Tax Receiver. A lot of taxpayers think it is done electronically; it is not. Banks and credit unions mail their payments from processing centers. The checks lack postmarks due to the banks having either pre-sorted first class or bulk mailing permits. With no discernible postmark, we have to go by the date the payment is received in our office. The delay in tax payments received applies only to individuals authorizing their banks to withdraw money from their accounts to pay their property taxes.

Tax payments sent via mail:

Please note that when mailing your tax payments we use the US postmark as well. If a postmark is not stamped on the envelope, such as with the stamps that are purchased from machines or printed off your computer, by law we have to use the date we receive it in the office. This can cause payments to be late and additional interest would then be added.
